Request a Packet

Contact your local certification agency to request a packet which includes the documents needed to apply. To find a certification worker by county, visit www.dcf.wisconsin.gov/cccertification and click "Certification Contacts".

The packet contains a copy of the Child Care Certification Rules Chapter DCF 202 and the Standards and Checklist. These documents will help you prepare for your site visit.

Complete Course Requirements

While preparing to become regulated, you will want to ensure you have completed the required courses.

Provisional Certified - Before caring for children:

-Abusive Head Trauma Prevention (AHT)

-Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS)

Complete these during the first 3 months of regulation:

-Introduction to the Child Care Profession -Fundamentals of Family Child Care -Infant & Toddler CPR

* A provider is no longer "provisionally" certified upon completion of these required courses.

Submit Application

Complete and submit the required documents with fee's (based on your county) to the local certification office.

Prepare for your Initial Visit

After your application is processed and approved, the certification worker will contact you to schedule an initial home visit to inspect for health and safety standards.

Each year, certified family child care providers are required to complete up to 5 hours of continuing education.

STATE LAW REQUIRES

Wisconsin State Law requires that child care providers must be regulated if you are caring for more than 3 nonrelated children under the age of 7 and if you plan on caring for children receiving Wisconsin Shares.

WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE?

CERTIFIED



Certified child care providers may care for up to 3 unrelated children and additional related children under the age of 7 with a maximum group size of 6.

LICENSED

Licensed child care providers may care for up to 8 children including providers own children under the age of 7.

Start "Pre-Licensing" Process

Read the DCF 250 "Licensing Rules for Family Child Care Centers". Fill out & submit the Family Child Care Business Start-up Worksheet to Supporting Families Together Association in Madison, WI. A technical consultant will be assigned to guide you through the start-up process.

During the "Pre-Licensing" process, you will write your policies for your program. After working with your technical consultant on your policies, they will schedule a site visit where the *Initial Licensing Checklist (DCF-F 2241)* will be used to demonstrate that you have met all items on this list and are ready to submit your application to Licensing.

Complete Course Requirements

During the time you are preparing to become regulated and are working through the Pre-Licensing process, you will want to ensure you have completed the required courses.

These include:

-Introduction to the Child Care Profession -Includes Abusive Head Trauma Prevention (AHT) & Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS)

-Fundamentals of Family Child Care

-Fundamentals for Infant/Toddler Care - Must be completed within 6 months if caring for children under age 2 -CPR with AED - Must be completed within 6 months

Submit Licensing Application

A list of documents to be submitted will be given to you at your Pre-Licensing site visit.

Fill out and send in the Child Care Center License Application with the fee and other documents required.

Obtain a Family Child Care License

If the Licensing Specialist finds all items on the *Initial Licensing Checklist* in compliance, a Family Child Care License will be issued.

Each year, licensed family child care providers are required to complete 15 hours of continuing education.
